Prerequisite Knowledge

Prerequisite knowledge required for the acquisition of the course corresponds to the study programme admission requirements and the general knowledge, skills and competences obtained at the previous level of education.

Study Course Abstract

The aim of the course is for students to gain an understanding of the activities and interests of Asian and Western countries in creating a geopolitical environment from the 18th century to the present day, focusing on Asian cultural, social, political, and international relations.

The objectives of the course are to discuss issues such as: cultural anthropology of Asia, including languages, peoples and historical roots; types of organizations, agriculture, food and food production in Asia; demography and migrations; core areas of growth and diffusion in Asia; 19th-century European impact on East and Southeast Asia; China's and Japan's response to the West; the decline and fall of empires in East Asia and the national resurrection of Asian states; the Cold War in Asia and post-war nation-building; power, authority; new trends in Asia.

The course is taught in English.
